Report from Bruce Holland MCCU Director for Public Relations

For the second year running the Midland Counties Chess Union provided a qualifier from the ranks of junior players. Fifteen year old Dharshan Kumaran from Harrow was one of the players to be granted a place at the British Championships, by virtue of coming equal second in the tournament. Lawrence Cooper from Stafford also qualified. Players who had already qualified were able to take part in the Tournament, which was a Leigh Grand Prix event, and the outright winner was Susan Arkell, Britain's leading woman chess player, who recovered from a losing position in the last round to beat J.H.Shepley from Guildford, to win with a score of 5 out of 6. Susan's husband Keith was also taking part, but an early defeat against Ian Dutton

took him out of contention for the lead, although he did finish as one of the players in joint second position. Susan and Keith were already qualified for entry to the British Championship. Craig Dawson gained an entry but declined because he was unable to attend. There was also a Minor (U125) Tournament..

It was a case of winner takes all, and with the diagrammed position, after Black's 33rd move, Susan Arkell comments that it looks as if White can win material with 34 Qf5 ch Kg8 35 Qc2, but 35 ... Ne3 !! wins for Black. The actual continuation was 34 Ng4 Nxg4 35 Qxg4 Bxf2 ch 36 Kxf2 Rxf1 37 Kxf1 Ne3 ch 38 Kg1 Nxg4, with an easy win for Black.

The Harry Baines Memorial British Chess Federation Congress, Eastbourne 1990

Devonshire Park Exhibition Halls, 30 July - 11 August.

The 77th Championships of the British Chess Federation, named in memory of Harry Baines, the late Chief Arbiter of the Federation, attracted 923 entries to 28 tournaments. The Congress received very generous financial support from Mr. Baines' family.

The strength of the British Championship was a record, with ten GMs, sixteen Masters, one WGM and three WMs in the field of seventyfour.

Jim (The Kid) Plaskett was the least favoured of the GMs, but in winning, with 9/11, he met six GMs and had a tournament rating of 2737. The leading scores were :

Michael Adams retained the Under-21 title, which he has now won for four of the past five years. Susan Arkell (Derby) won the British Ladies' title by scoring 6/11 in the Championship Tournament.

Some more scores by Midland players in the Championship : Keith Arkell (Derby) and Glenn Flear (Leicester) 6.5; Mark Hebden (Leicester), Graeme Buckley (Wolverhampton), Chris Ward and Philip Morris (Leicester University) 6; Adam Collinson (Kenilworth), Stephen Cullip (Rushden), Dharshan Kumaran (Qualified at Birmingham), Jonathan Parker (Edinburgh, formerly Nottingham) 5.5; Simon Bibby (Sutton Coldfield), Lawrence Cooper (Stafford) 5; Christine Flear (Leicester), Vic Knox (Cheadle) 4.5; Andrew Bryce (Midland nominee), David Knox (Cheadle) 3.5.

In the U-18 Championship Stephen Calderwood (Coalville) shared first place on 8/11.

In the U-15 Championship Stephen Joseph (Stapleford) shared first place on 5.5/7.

In the U-14 Championship Joe Vere (Draycott) took first place with 6/7.

These three are currently MCCU Junior Champions : Stephen Joseph at U-18, Stephen Calderwood at U-16, and Joe Vere at U-14. Each received support from the MCCU, in the form of free (to the player) entry.

In the Major Open, Jonathan Nelson was first equal, on 8/11, and so qualifies for next year's British Championship.

After an absence of about a decade from chess, Jim Nicolson, a founder member of Greater Manchester County Chess Association, made a return in the Veteran's event, and took second place, behind P.C.Hoad.

The Formal Structure of the MCCU

The day to day affairs of the Midland Counties Chess Union are run by a Board, which meets formally at least four times a year, and which is answerable to the Annual General Meeting held in June and an Extra-ordinary General Meetin held in November.

At the AGM held in June 1990 the following directors were elected to the Board.

All the posts are honorary, and the executive directors are expected to act individually within their terms of reference and delegate tasks to others as necessary. The non-executive directors function as "watch dogs" on behalf of the General Meetings of the Union, to make sure that radical changes from custom and practice or new initiatives are likely to gain the wider acceptance of the member County Associations. The General Meetings of the Union are attended by elected and appointed officials, and delegates from the County Chess Associations. These arrangements are designed to strike a fair balance between the organisation being responsive to opportunities as they arise whilst remaining under democratic control.

Guaranteed Grading

What is the service that most chess players are interested in ? No doubt about the answer to this - grading ! The Grading Service, administered by the British Chess Federation through their computer at Hastings and fed by a tireless regional and local network of graders, is the jewel in the Federation's crown. A problem is that some events are ungraded. Consequently from January 1991 the MCCU will be introducing the "Guaranteed Grading" Scheme. The keystones of this will be as follows :

(1) The MCCU will guarantee that all events/tournaments subscribing to the scheme will be graded. The Union will initiate a logo to be published on all literature as a guarantee that the event will be graded.

(2) The Grading List is copyright the MCCU/BCF - events not covered by the guaranteed scheme will not be allowed to publish grades at their congress/event. Similarly this would mean non scheme events could not offer grading prizes.

(3) The MCCU will make a charge for grading events. However the Union will offer the following benefits : -

- (a) A national grading list supplied to all events.
- (b) Check credentials of any ungraded players,
- with access to full grading services.(c) Advertising of events in MCCU list.
- (d) Feedback of performances after grading.
- (e) Future benefits of sponsorship/mailing lists as scheme develops.
